

Authors' Guidelines

1. Scope of the journal

The European Psychomotricity Journal (EPJ) is the official e-journal of the European Forum of Psychomotricity (EFP). It is an open access, peer-reviewed journal, published once a year.

The editorial policy of EPJ pursues the aims of the European Forum of Psychomotricity: to promote high standards of scientific study in the field of psychomotricity advancing the practice, research and education of Psychomotricity across Europe. Since 2024, under the EFP framework, the EPJ has expanded its scope to include both scientific and divulgative articles on an international level. This alignment reinforces the journal's mission to disseminate psychomotor philosophy and benefit individuals of all ages globally.

Psychomotricity is an interdisciplinary field that integrates cognitive, emotional, symbolic and physical interactions, to enhance an individual's ability to act and interact within a psychosocial context through movement and play. It is based on a holistic vision of the human being, emphasizing the unity of body and mind. The practice of psychomotricity involves various approaches across different European countries, focusing on the mutual influence of cognition, emotion, and movement on the development of personal competencies.

Psychomotricity is used in preventive, pedagogical, and therapeutic contexts, involving activities that promote well-being, prevent issues, provide care and support rehabilitation. It is relevant for all ages, from infancy to old age, including specific stages such as pregnancy and end-of-life care.

The European Forum of Psychomotricity (EFP) is proud to embark on this new challenge with the European Psychomotricity Journal (EPJ). We aim to provide the scientific and professional community with a valuable tool for the sharing and dissemination of psychomotricity knowledge. We hope that EPJ will become a cornerstone in the field of psychomotricity, fostering collaboration and innovation at an international level.

2. Guidelines for Authors

a. General information

EPJ will not consider for publication any manuscript under review elsewhere or substantially similar to a manuscript already published. Editors retain the right to reject manuscripts that do not meet established ethical standards. Full instructions are available on EPJ Guidelines.

All sources used and all literature must be listed in full in the list of sources and references. All literal quotations and analogous references must be marked. All aids that I have used, including generative Al (like ChatGPT or CoPilot) or dialog systems, must be made transparent. Used resources must be listed after the list of sources and references. This assurance applies to all parts of the manuscript. Please also submit a cover letter that contains the name(s) of the author(s) and affiliation(s), and the street address, telephone, fax, and electronic mail address of the corresponding author. A corresponding author's submission to EPJ implies that all co-authors have agreed to the content and form of the paper. Any financial interest or conflict of interest must be explained to the Editor in the cover letter. Please add always a contribution statement at the end of your paper, which gives clear information about the role and the contribution of the



authors. The corresponding author is responsible for informing all co-authors, of paper submission, editorial decisions, reviews, and revisions.

EPJ is an Open Access journal which means that all content is freely available without charge to the user or his/her institution, giving reference to the source, in compliance with the usual scientific standards. Users are allowed to read, download, copy, distribute, print, search, or link to the full texts of the articles, or use them for any other lawful purpose, without asking prior permission from the publisher or the author. This is in accordance with the BOAI definition of Open Access.

Manuscripts will be submitted electronically, as an attachment to an email in Word®, to Carefully proofread the final revision, check the references for accuracy, and retain a copy of the manuscript.

The EPJ has two main categories to give opportunities for different contributions with a scientific or practice-oriented focus:

- Research and development in psychomotricity is a journal category for scientific articles in the field. Studies, research projects and development work are published here. Articles in this category undergo a peer review process, based on usual scientific standards.
- Forum Psychomotricity is a category for contributions aimed primarily at practitioners. Typical contributions here are, for example, articles on practical interventions or reports from working groups. Contributions in this category undergo an editor check, but no peer review process. If you have other interesting information from politics, society or culture that you think will advance the field of psychomotor skills (like for e.g. reports from congresses, political decisions concerning Psychomotricity), please do not hesitate to upload your contribution for a quick check.

b. Preparation of Manuscripts

Manuscripts must be written in English. Text should be supplied in a format compatible with MS Word for Windows. Charts and tables are considered textual and should also be supplied in a format compatible with MS Word. All figures should be supplied in .jpg format. All manuscripts must be typed in 12pt font and in double space with margins of at least 2.5 cm. Papers should not exceed 20 pages including tables and figures. Authors should prepare manuscripts according to the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA) (7th ed.).

Using the APA as a guide, pay particular attention to manuscript content and organization (see https://apastyle.apa.org), editorial style, and manuscript preparation. Check format against APA sample paper. Note that Method is singular, and the heading, Participants, is preferred over Subjects. Insert line numbers 1-17 in the left margin of each page, beginning with the abstract page. This facilitates providing line-by-line feedback. Indicate relevance by referring to theories, paradigms, or conceptual frameworks and briefly reviewing the existing knowledge base. Use person-first, non-sexist language in your writing, according to PMPA standards. APA requires reporting both statistical significance and effect size, when appropriate.

Title page. This should contain the article title, a running head not exceeding 50 characters (including spaces), and full contact details of the authors. One corresponding author should be identified, whose e-mail address will be provided.



Abstracts. Authors submitting papers should note that abstracts are required (150-200 words). These should outline the questions investigated, the design, essential findings and main conclusions of the study. After the abstract 3-5 keywords should be mentioned.

Text. This should in general, but not necessarily, be divided into sections with the headings: Introduction, Method, Results, Discussion, Conclusion, Applications, Tables and Figures. Tables and figures should be referred to text as follows: Figure 1, Table 1. The place at which a table or figure is to be inserted in the printed text should be indicated clearly on a manuscript. Each table and/or figure must have a legend that explains its purpose without reference to the text. Artwork submitted for publication will not be returned and will be destroyed after publication, unless otherwise requested.

Refrences. EPJ uses the APA system to indicate references in the text, tables and legends. The full references should be listed alphabetically and presented following the text of the manuscript. References are formatted according to the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA) (7th ed.), including the DOI (Digital Object Identifier). On the website http://www.crossref.org/SimpleTextQuery you can check a complete bibliography and copy out the Digital Object Identifiers (DOI) of the registered literature entries or the complete bibliographies with added DOIs.

c. Submission of Manuscripts

Manuscripts for consideration should be submitted electronically, as an attachment to an email, to the Journal's editorial office: info@psychomotricity-journal.eu.

Please send two versions that are textually identical: One version is anonymized, so that authors are not identifiable, even via their literature references. Another version contains all author details and bibliographical information.

d. Author-Side-Fees

The submission and peer-review of manuscripts are free of charge. After the positive evaluation of a paper, 80 Euros (€) have to be paid by the author, in order the paper will be published. The details for the bank transfer are provided to the authors as soon as their manuscript is accepted for publication.

e. Copyright

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The authors are free to make the published articles publicly accessible free of charge, on the Internet, on an institutional server or in a suitable professional repository at the earliest parallel to the date of publication by the publisher but without modification in content or layout of the EPJ version. Further publications of the work are subject to compliance with the Creative Commons license with the complete title information and a link to the electronic version of the first publication.

f. Supplementary Material

These are guidelines for the submission of supplementary material to the journal including animations, movie files and sound files that can be accessed via the online edition and additional information, including indexes and calendars.



All files of supplementary material should be submitted in an uncompressed format that can be used universally on PCs and Macs. All files should be kept to a minimum size.

Files should be submitted to the journal editor along with the manuscript. If required please supply a legend(s) or description(s) with the additional material to be mounted online and a reference to the file.

Authors who are unable to submit in any of the formats mentioned are advised to contact the publisher to discuss other options prior to submission.

Animation. Animations are limited to 30 seconds and to a maximum of 500 MB. Animations in the following forms (in order of preference) can be accepted from authors:

- Video tape
- AVI's, QuickTime or Mpeg's files
- A sequence of still image

The following formats can be accepted:

- All uncompressed formats widely used on PC, Mac, and UNIX
- JPEG for coloured and compressed images (suffix .jpeg)
- TIFF with a group IV compression for black and white compressed images (suffix.tiff)
- EPS files for vector and a combination of vector and bitmap images (suffix .eps)
- FLI and FLC format from AutoDesk.

Authors who submit animations are requested to provide the following information:

- Video tape format used.
- AVI, QuickTime or Mpeg files version used, and system used for disk file creation.
- Sequences of still images format used, version, and system used for disk file creation.

Authors who are unable to supply the following: videotape, AVI, QuickTime or Mpeg file(s), may provide the publisher with a set of sequential still images. Note that an animated sequence will consist of 13 to 15 still images per second of animation; e.g., if an animated sequence is 10 seconds in duration, it is made up of 130 images.

Animation should be mentioned in the text. Indicate an approximate location for the animation call-out in the margin.

Movie files. Movie files should be submitted as AVI, QuickTime or Mpeg file. These should be uncompressed and in a universal format for PC or Mac. For ease of download, the recommended upper limit for the size of a single file is 10 Megabytes. When the size of a single file is bigger than this, some users may experience problems when downloading. Whenever possible, therefore this limit should be adhered to.

Sound files. Sound files should be submitted as .WAV or .MP3 files. These should be uncompressed and in a universal format for PC or Mac.

- All files should be kept to a minimum size where possible.
- A legend or description of the sound file to be mounted online should be supplied to the editor.



Additional text files. Additional text files, such as legends, indexes and calendars should be supplied in a standard word processing document such as MS Word or PDF with the correct links/URL(s) if applicable. Standard positioning online for additional information is after the "Abstract" and before the "References" or on the "Table of Contents", please state if you require different positioning online.
